I have this week since Thursday been labouring under a severe attack of cold in my whole system and particularly in my throat so as to deprive me of the power of articulating sentences in succession. Until 9 o'clock the last Eve I was without any prospect of supply for the Church, until Mrs. Edger of Barton of Porrobyrn agreed to send me a clergyman for the morning. Accordingly Rev. Stafford of Bourne assisted to the Rector of Rector of the Church of the Holy Trinity preached for me in the morning and performed the whole service administered by the Holy Communion to about 30 persons.

William Phelps of Buffalo. He was late Commander
of the British forces at Hong Kong and arrived
in this country about a fortnight since
with his family from Hong Kong in the ship

London London which now lies
behind our Chapel. His object was to
engage me to help him in looking after
a sailor by the name of Jenkins who
was lame in his heel, and with whom
he sailed from Hong Kong to this port.
and in whose spiritual welfare he had
been much interested. Found the next
day on investigation that he had been
at the Sarcos Home in Cherry St where
he evinced a very religious disposition.
Some of his shipmates who had dissipated
all their money in profligacy & debauchery
since their arrival knowing he possessed
about 50 dollars had a plot with their
Dutch Landlord in Water St to entice
him from the Sarcos Home & rob him
& in spite of the earnest remonstrances
of Capt Syre at the Sarcos Home they
induced him to take away his chest.

under pretence of going to Boston to get
into the Hospital. For this purpose they called
in a carriage at the home for him having first
given him some drugged liquor that deranged
his mind - and were too successful in their
wicked plot to remove him away from him
In four days he came back to the Sailors
Home asking for admittance but without
his chest having been robbed of every cent
of his money. A cartman was sent with him
to his Dutch boarding house for his chest, but
the landlord refused to deliver it until
he had paid his bill for board & liquor
amount to about 10 or 12 \$, in 4 days
board. The case it was seen was
one of those common cases of villainous
iniquity in which the sailor is every
day the dupe of these landlords, and
the poor victim of robbery and crime
frankred upon their easy and confiding nature,
with an empty pocket, an almost naked body and
& a broken he will be turned into the street in a few days.
