Tuesday July 9, 1849. At 12 o'clock noon  
this day I took the Steam Boat to  
South Amboy on my way to Phila  
delphia to attend the consecration of  
the Floating Church of the Redeemer  
just built & completed by E. L. Dennington  
and moored at Dock St Wharf in that  
city. It is the most beautiful Floating  
Church in the World and its Exterior  
is surpassed by the Interior.

At  $\frac{1}{2}$  past 10 o'clock on Wednesday Morning  
the clergy to the number of -  
with Bishop Potter assembled at a country  
House near & proceeded to the Church  
S. Doty was appointed to read the Morning  
Prayer as far as the Lessons & I was appointed  
by the Pastor to read the concluding portion  
of the Morning Prayer. After his Sermon  
which was Extemporaneous by Bishop Potter  
on the text: My Sabbath shall ye keep without  
other notice to me than a verbal one at  
the time of singing up, he called upon me  
to make an address which I was enabled

to do with considerable fluency and  
effect to the large crowded congregation  
who attended. I addressed them for about  
20 minutes. This address was delivered  
about one o'clock at noon on Thursday  
and in Friday morning New York Herald  
a notice of the services of the consecra-  
tion of the Church and of my address  
was circulated in that paper to all the  
city of New York 100 miles distant - communi-  
cated by some letter writers or by telegraph.  
On Monday Evg on my return from the meeting  
of the Board of Managers from Missin  
I received from the Vice President of the Society  
of Young Men owning the Flattery Ch of the  
Redeemer these an invitation for every  
Member of our board, by telegraph from  
Philadelphia and on Tuesday had the same  
communicated, to attend the services  
of the consecration. The severity of the  
cold which was at zero. Most of the week  
prevented all others from attending except  
Rev Saml R. Smith and one from Vice President.

Bible say Remember the sabbath day to keep it Holy In it thou shalt do no manner of work, for the sabbath is the Lord thy Gods, Now <sup>the</sup> mate if you take what belongs to the Almighty to do ships work in aint you a thief. You a fool said the mate pettishly I dont know anything about it, It may be so I said the Cook I may be a fool I know I dont know much, but I think one day you will believe you are just what I called you just now a thief or there is no God in the universe.

The mate pretended to laugh at the poor Cook, and to ridicule his Methodist notions but what the honest simple minded Cook had said to him sank deep into his soul he could not get rid of it. ~~He says~~ <sup>the words</sup> often repeat it to himself, I am a thief. If I dont God Almighty ophis Sabbath I am a thief and he is right & the Bible says so and somewhere the Bible says, will ye rob God yet ye have robbed me. The Cook is right and I am a prophouse & wicked man.

The conversation with the Cook long lingered indelibly on his mind. He could not get rid of it. At last he began to read the Bible



The Cook observed it and said to him one day  
perhaps Sir that may be true what I said  
the other day. The mate could not conceal his  
feelings. Yes he replied it is true & you  
was right I have been thinking of it & now I  
fully believe it. I have been a pretty hard  
summer Cook, but I hope God will forgive me  
You must pray for me. From this time The  
Cook, tried to encourage him to pray for himself.  
He often afterwards talked with him in his  
poor manner as he expressed it and now  
he believes God made him an instrument  
in his own hands. for the Conversion of the male  
and it really would seem as if it was so. -  
One such man in a ship may be the means of  
saving a whole crew. I hope to hunt the Cook up  
tomorrow on board his vessel & to put more tracts into  
his hands & perhaps some books to distribute for he will  
doubtless have more to do with passengers and  
crew who will all come often to the galley than  
any man on board his vessel. There will doubtless  
be a great number of souls on board that ship  
bound at this time to the land the which thousands  
are now hastening -

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Monday, Feby, 5<sup>th</sup> 1849. At the request of one  
the passengers (a son of a clergyman in  
of Connecticut) who goes to California  
in the Bark Stur Welsh to sail  
tomorrow Feby. 6<sup>th</sup> at an early hour  
I went to the Chapel and made  
up a large bundle of religious books as  
no other I learned had been put  
onboard for 100 passengers

Had a very interesting visit at the house of Mrs Dickman wife of Capt Dickman 92 Eldredge St this day. It will be seen by this journal that on last Xmas day Dec 25, 1848, in the midst of a violent rain, in the presence of his mother & his two sisters, I baptized - Edward Augustus Dickman a young sailor who had a brother who was to sail that day in the <sup>Steam</sup> Ship Boston for California & who was anxious to be baptized in presence of his brother before he left the port. This young sailor Edward Augustus had attended the chapel for some months previously & impressions of a religious character had been made upon his mind. He often unknown to me in times past had put up a note for the prayer of the congregation for his brother who was then at sea. He was now anxious he should be present at his baptism & hastened it & requested on the morning of Xmas for a call at my house that it should be done that day (brother seen on a day afterwards understood and that he was to sail in the Ship Boston the week after this

July 21 1849

His mother told me to day with tears that she had now been led to the altar by this son, instead of his leading her. That henceforth the Chapel would be her spiritual home and that of her family that every member of it felt deeply interested in our services & when utter surprize her husband was induced to attend there the last Sunday whom she had not known to go into a place of public worship for some years past. I was much interested with our services & would now attend there with her. She said he did not go with her, not sit with her, but went alone by himself which the more created her surprize. I gratitude to God she did not dare tell him, then he was to be baptized on Thursday at our chapel. lest he should say when you are going to make a fool of the boy & yourself. She told him the following Sunday - when to her surprize he

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seemed hurt. he did not know if it as  
he said he woud have been glad to have  
been present - This family have no regular  
place of worship - & now seem all so  
deeply interested in our services that with  
the mother & daughter for years  
woud of them today and seemed  
most grateful for my call -

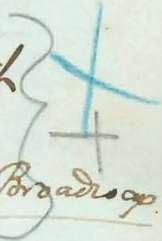

In the morning I officiated in the largest of our morning services during the year (said before Easter) and preached on the text They that wait on the Lord shall renew their strength they shall mount up with wings as eagles & there was a large congregation of seamen, and Capt Johnson (of Perry Manhattan which way abandoned on the edge of the gulph) Swear on the 27th of March taken with his officer and crew from their sinking vessel. - was present and returned thanks to Almighty God in his own name for preserving by his merciful providence and saving him from and them from a horrible death.

In the afternoon was also a full congregation. I officiated and preached on the text, He is able to save all them to the uttermost who come unto God by him.

In the Evg there was a good congregation for numbers. I preached on the text, after read Evg service, You good men in the morning stand and as the early dew it passeth away.

Monday, Apr. 1. 1849. Wrote my annual report to board of managers, & left it with Mr. Davenport the Swearman to read this Evg at the meeting before Easter Monday, I being detained at home by a wedding. At 8 P.M. at my house 114 East Broadway, in presence of my wife and Mrs Augustus Lewis and my bowers I married Edward Mc Kenna, of Catherine St N York <sup>to</sup> Jane Ross, of 52 Orchard St N York Mrs Ross, two sisters were also witnesses.
