New York Tuesday afternoon October 10. 1840
This afternoon I accompanied Mary Cooke &
her sister Chlo who were saved from the
burning Ship Ocean Monarch on board the
Steam Boat Connecticut for Stonington & Provi-
dence, to go to Johnson Saimonsville
to join her sister Alice Cooke ^{the wife of} then husband
James Cooke residing there & put into her
hands a letter from Alice Cooke informing
her, her brother in Law Peter Coxe ~~has~~
~~was~~ saved from the burning Ship as she had
received a letter from him. He was reported
with his wife Rachael & infant in the list
of those unaccounted for & was supposed to
be lost.

A remarkable and Providential incident
occurred in connection with my interview
with this woman & child which I will
here record

Edward Baalham the 3^d Mate of the Ship
Ship New World who saved ^{Mary Cooke & child} them from the burning
Ship Ocean Monarch left home in England
in Early life. He had a sister who emigrated
to America when he was very young

and of whom he retained only an im-
perfect recollection. He had heard nothing
of her for more than 20 years & believed
she was dead. As he had been leading
the roving life of a sailor he had few
opportunities of seeing any one who could
give him any information calculated
to remove this impression from his mind.
When I wrote the letter of Sept 25, inserted
in the Providence Daily Journal of Sept 28,
1848, relating the fact that Mary Cook & the
infant child were ^{the floating} ~~at~~ ^{on} Sunday 24th
of Sept 1848, with Mr. Baitham the Post, ever
left the ship New York who saved her through
her into New York in order to return thanks
to him in his house for the preservation of their lives,
and asking for information of people in the
vicinity of Providence respecting the residence
of her sister Alice Cooper wife of James
Cooper residing 4 miles ^{somewhere} out of
Providence, that letter was ^{glanced upon} ~~read~~ in that
paper by some one who read it aloud
in the hearing of another person. That
person told his wife of the letter and advised

her to read it without thinking of any thing
more than merely entertaining her by the
interesting incident which the letter
contained - She did read it and laid
it aside & the whole matter had nearly
passed from her mind, when a thought
of home was by some accident recalled
in her mind & in her musings of her father
and Mother who were ~~now~~ dead and
of her brother whom she remembered when
a mere child & whom she also believed to
be dead, for she had heard after some
time he was lost at sea, the question occurred
to her whether she had any positive info-
mation of his death & if she had not, whether
it was not possible that this man, whose
name was the same, ^{but} might not be a
relative of her family whom she had
been separated when she left England -
& might not give her some information she
accordingly stated the questioning of her
mind to her husband, who encouraged her in
the hope that some information might be

Blamed and advised her writing to the Mr. Baitham & propose to him - the questions she wrote to have answered respecting her brother. She accordingly wrote to Mr. Edward Baitham the 30th Mate of ship New York & addressed her letter to New York. Mr. Baitham answered ^{it} ^{and} ^{on} ^{further} ^{correspondence} ^{discovered} ^{it} ^{was} ^{from} ^{his} ^{own} ^{sister} - who he was told, before he left home, had gone to America, for he was put out as a farmers or butchers boy when very young, & knew nothing very particular with regard to the movements of this sister, or her husband. He accordingly soon after went on to Providence and to the town near and found this sister whom he supposed dead, & by whom he was himself supposed also to be dead. The meeting was mutually surprising unexpected and joyful. & as he was now the active officer the 2^d Mate of the ship John R. Skiddy about 10 o'clock in a day or two for Liverpool & could not long be absent he brought her on to New York & kept her a week with him & yesterday took her back to Providence & was to return on Monday back to his ship in New York.

October 14, 1848. The whole proceedings &
a minute & full report of the speeches
delivered at the presentation of the Free
Stone of the city to Geneva on the Ev'g of
28th of September 1848 were reported
by me and published in the New York
Observer of October 14, 1848 occupying
3 1/2 columns. I gave it to this paper
because it has a circulation to 17000.
Subscribers among Presbyterians & I thought
it a good opportunity to ^{let} them know what
the Church was doing for the cause of Geneva.

it had been to my church within the
last few Sundays and that he was
now in much distress of mind. My
inquiry on account of my past life re-
vealed he was in great that several
weeks ago I was on the point of
putting an end to my existence. In
fact, there was no more happiness
for me in this world and in the
world to come. I had come fully to this awful
resolution when God - carried me
into your church. If I heard you
preach on the text: "The corruption
must put on incorruption & the mortal
must put on immortality. By which
made me feel sin that these ~~are~~

a reality in the scene beyond the
grave which I had never felt before
That sermon in underground saved
me my life and I cannot feel too
thankful to you for the benefit
I have received from it. I then
conversed with him some time
on the simplicity of the act as any
one could see also the folly of it. For no
man could flee from God's Spirit
or escape from his hand. He
acknowledged it & wished to be
permitted to call and see me
again and said he wished to seek
the salvation of his soul which I
encouraged him to do.

 my wife in a carriage to dine with Dr. Thurcutler
 at Brooklyn and left her there till Friday
 morning of the same week, while on Tuesday
 next day after Stuar, I went at 12 o'clock with
 Mrs C. L. Dennington servant & child to Philadelphia
 to be present at a meeting of the Clergy
 with a large party to make the excursion
 in the Floating Church of the Redeemer
 put built by Mrs C. L. Dennington for the
 Churchman's Missionary Society of Philadelphia
 for seamen and women & to be towed
 from Bordentown where it was built to
 Philadelphia on Wednesday Morning Dec 29
 1848. The excursion proved a failure. The
 two boats Fashion & Washington proceeded with about
 10 of the Clergy and 50 or 70 other persons to Burlington

Dec 27

9 miles below Bordentown in consequence
of a violent Snow storm & lacking the
Church of the Redeemer that day was
relinquished. There were however interesting
ceremonies on board in the students of
Bowdoin College presenting a flag to
the Board of Managers, which was received
by Bishop Potter who was on board
to a particular and extended account
of which is given in the Episcopal Recorder
of Dec 30, 1848 with Bishop Doane's
Poem on the occasion of the Church
leaving port his dwelling -
I returned to New York on Thursday
at 8 o'clock in the eve of the Church of
the Redeemer was towed to Phila-
delphia from Bordentown by the
Steamer (Bow Boat) the ~~Camden~~
~~on Saturday~~ Morr on Friday Morning
Dec 29, 1848. in a much more
violent snow storm than we had on
