Dennington, to stand as Witness to the administration of the rite.

Brooklyn St Ann's Church

In the Evening I preached at the Lecture room  
of St Ann's Church for the Rev. B. C. Cutler

Monday, Sept 18, 1848. A hard day's work. Labored all day by writing  
3 articles for the paper about Fred Jerome of New  
York who saved 15 persons from drowning in the ocean  
Monarch, 40 miles from Liverpool Aug 24, 1848. & by  
interviews and communications in writing with  
Alderman Franklin obtained the by resolution of  
the city council to give him the freedom of the  
city in a gold Broc. & a vote of thanks. Also wrote &  
sent to New York & Belfast a letter giving a sketch  
of ~~Fred~~ <sup>John</sup> Fred Jerome which was published in  
the Express. of Wednesday Sept 20, 1848. & copied  
in New York Herald - on Saturday Sept 23, and  
in the Boston Daily Advocate - Friday Sept 22. Indulged  
in some sleep. Went to Highland Light House to my  
wife on Wednesday morning. On Saturday afternoon was  
present with Capt. Knight on board the New World at examination  
in a slate room alone one by one of the two boats except of the  
New World respecting the service of the two boats in saving life  
during two hours examination.

The above men returned thanks to Almighty  
God in his house for preserving their lives from

After alluding to the numerous ex-  
erpts of the sailors of the New World who  
were present on Savoy life I stated to  
the congregation I wrote them present  
them in their name and my own  
a Bible tract - with a suitable inscrip-  
tion. the ~~same~~ worded in God's letters  
respecting the event.

This I accordingly, did calling each  
man by his name & presenting  
the Bible in the audience sight  
of the whole congregation.

Friday Evg. Sept. 28. 1848 At the Request of the  
Committee of both boards of the Governor council before  
an immense audience (only one in 6 who deserved it  
were able to gain admittance to the house) at Red  
Mr. Chases Church the Mariners Ch in Rosewell St on  
a platform with the Mayor of the city Frederick Denme  
on one side of me Harry Crooks on the other, on  
Alderman Morris Franklin presenting to Denme the  
Freedom of the city, in a gold box for saving 15 persons  
off of the Bowditch or the ocean Monarch I danoys on  
board the Merrimac two winters ago. I made  
an address from Denme in reply to Alderman

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Franklin addressed both which were reported the next morning in the New York Herald of Saturday Sept 29<sup>th</sup> 1848. & the Weekly Herald of the same day.

1000 copies of the wood cut of ~~the~~ ocean Monarch on fire were distributed that Exp printed at expense of the city with the account of the catastrophe & the names of the men in the two Boats of the New York, with the name of Mary Crook & Isidor Child - their name appeared on every copy of the whole of which was pasted in the Bible presented to the men of the two boats with their names in gold letters on the back - The whole affair was a very imposing Simplicity one Saturday - Mr. Frederick Devens came to visit me, & I conversed with him nearly 2 hours giving him good advice & took down his own history from his relation of it as the events of his life occurred to his

The speeches and proceedings of the presentation  
of the freedom of the city to Devens were reported in  
the New York Herald Daily Weekly of Saturday Sept 30<sup>th</sup> 1848 & more fully in  
the New York Tribune of October 14<sup>th</sup> 1848
