I therefore did as he requested and sent about 8 persons with Bibles and sent about ^{also} 8 persons with Bibles I had given them to him in order that he might write the names in ^{of the} recipient in each together with his own. I found he was a poor man & most solemnly admonished each that they received the gift from the alms of God and hoped they would feel ~~that~~

and remember that they did. or
be at the reliving of about the 15 or 18
years to whom I had given four
of whom had received Pebbles
from him by my hands. put into
my hands two dollars to pay him

At the commencement of the services there
was a vagrant sailor who had been
here before to church the last Sunday, ~~and~~.
and who made some disturbance in speaking
to me alone on leaving the house at the
middle of the service. now seated in the
front seat on the female side of the house and
leaving he would again annoy the
congregation by his talking. Supposing
him again importunate I requested Mr.
C. S. Parker to have him put out
before we began. It was not done
in the hope he would keep silent.

He was evidently very nervous & drew all
the service time and dray the sermon -
fearing annoyance from him. But

In the evening I attended the Church of the Good Shepherd in Market St with Bishop Colton Chase - Revd Mrs Lady, and Hopkins Deacons and read my Prayer. NEW YORK HISTORICAL SOCIETY.—The regular monthly meeting of this society was held on Tuesday evening, at its rooms in the New York University. The proceedings commenced by the secretary reading several letters and communications, of some historical interest. Several new members were then nominated, who were referred to the Executive Committee : after which, Rev. B. C. C. Parker, of the Floating Church of Our Saviour, read a paper on the shipping and navigation of New York. He commenced by describing the astounding increase of commerce throughout this country in general, and by comparing it with that of other countries. He then confined himself especially to the shipping and navigation of New York alone, in connection with which, he referred to her growing cotton trade—to the superiority of her sailing vessels in particular—of her packet ships and clippers, and to the extent of her steam navigation, at present. He then minutely related the first efforts of Mr. Fitch in his application of steam power to the propelling of vessels, his first experiment on the Collect Pond, in New York, together with a description of the first trips of Mr. Fulton, his successor, from New York to Albany. At the conclusion of the composition, it was moved and carried that the society return thanks to ~~the~~ Rev. B. C. C. Parker for his elaborate, instructive and interesting document; after which, the assembly dispersed. In consequence of the great pressure of interesting matter, we are prevented from giving a more lengthened report of the proceedings.
