### Report of the Board of Managers.

The Managers are able to report another year of fruitful work.

The reports of the Missionaries, summarizing the results of their own labors and of the operations which they superintend, are certainly encouraging, and in the perusal of them there is found abundant sanction for the existence and continuance of the Society. And when one dwells a little longer upon these statements and reads in them and between the lines the story of what has been done to plant the seeds of Christian truth, to carry light into dark places, to relieve distress of body and mind, it is difficult to repress an enthusiasm for the work which it is the aim and object of the Society to accomplish.

For specific information upon these subjects reference is made to the accompanying reports of the Missionaries and Treasurer, which detail the operations of the Society with great particularity. One item of such details, however, we are constrained to present here, namely, the attendance at the reading-rooms during the year, which numbers about 116,000 persons. Who can measure or would assume to limit the good results of opportunities such as these?

We are confident that the records carry proof that the work of the Society is faithfully performed and is reassuring in its results. But for its accomplishment an ample treasury is needed, and it is here that we are brought face to face with the gravest problem which the Society has to solve.

The expenses for the year aggregate \$14,389.06, while the income has been but \$11,314.28, leaving a deficiency of \$3,074.78, which has been met by drawing upon the principal of the permanent fund, which is nearly exhausted.

This then means for the Society retrenchment or enlarged income. Retrenchment means impairment in the quantity and character of the work. And who of us would choose to be the first to counsel retreat, or the abandonment of any part of so good a field?

As in the past, so in the future, there will doubtless be gifts and bequests from charitable friends; but some more systematic method should be devised to direct the attention and interest of the benevolent and able to the operations which the Society has taken in hand, and to the urgent needs from which it is suffering.

The contributions for the year from different Churches aggregate \$2,987.46, showing, as compared with the previous year, a decrease of \$666.30.

Cannot the claims of the Society for generous maintenance be made in some way to find better lodgment here? And in this connection the Managers of the Society are urged to a more frequent personal inspection of the work as it is carried on, that the spark of enthusiasm kindled by the closer contact, and communicated to other minds, may excite in them a glow of interest that shall be betokened by their more liberal gifts.

The work in which the Society is engaged is good, noble and fruitful, and worthy of the recognition and support claimed for it. It is peculiar and unique, like the class of men with which it deals. In certain features of it, it has special compensation for those engaged in it. The minds of sailors are peculiarly open and impressionable, and the truths planted there have scope and space beyond ordinary conditions.

For our encouragement at this time it is well to be reminded that our work, though by designation apparently restricted to a single locality, is in fact by no means confined to the City or Port of New York, but has range and compass as wide and free as that of the seamen themselves. It moves on as they go, and with them follows the seas.

Before closing it is eminently fitting that grateful mention should be made in this report of Mr. Thomas P. Cummings, one of the original founders of the Society, and of Mr. Edgar M. Richards, another honored member, who, during the year, departed this life. For fifty years, the former, in the several capacities of Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary and Manager, and for nearly an equal period of time, the latter, served with unabated zeal the interests of the seamen and the Society, and their faithfulness kept measure with their long terms of service.





### Report of the Missionary

IN CHARGE OF THE

### Floating Church of Our Saviour.

At this hopeful season of awakening life we close another annual period of blessing in this bracing work down by the sea, and begin a new year of labor in this great tender cause. The bland spring sunshine seems typical of the divine approval which has marked our progress through the year; but as Easter sunshine is most prized by those who live nearest Nature, so, to those who look for it, may God's approval be more apparent than man's. The statistics written below give some hint of faithful activity, but such material estimate of results may appeal only to those who look upon "the things that are seen." The real good cannot be measured in Church pews, or summarized on paper to meet a narrow commercial sense of accomplishment. It would be highly encouraging could we have a wide vision of all the uplifting manifestations of saving grace in the hearts of seamen, who are with us to-day and away to-morrow; but that kind of sight-seeing is denied us who, perforce, must look so much through the faith faculty for evidences of success. \* \* \* \* Meanwhile we labor on to ship men for heavenly voyages, looking for the "blessing that shall be ours when our ships come in."

The appreciation of our Mission by these brave men, without home, Church or social surroundings, to whom we minister, is undiminished. Our religious services, social meetings, and entertainments are well attended. The library, reading and club rooms are especially prized since their enlargement last summer; our Floating Church Temperance Society, with the earnest advocacy of Mr. D. Montgomery, is very effective in rescuing and leading men up to spiritual quickening, and a goodly number of the thousands who come to us are sent on their way filled with hope, and rejoicing in the new life in Christ; the Men's Hope Club, a Mission Aid Society for the promotion of good fellowship, entertainment and encouragement of thrift among sailors, is increasing in membership and interest, and has come to be a strong arm of our week-night work in fishing for men; our Sundayschool, under the efficient superintendency of Mr. Benj. Watson, and the sewing school, are doing their part well in training a fine corps of coming \* \* \* \* men and women for usefulness.

Our beloved Bishop visited the Chapel on the second Sunday after Trinity, and administered the rite of confirmation to eight persons.

The gifts from the Morrill Fund have been a great blessing in time of need to many sick and destitute seamen, and to dependent seamen's families. We have also been able to aid a long list of other poor from donations received for that purpose.

My grateful thanks are due to the members of the Board, and others, for their kind contributions to the success of our Annual Excursion, the Thanksgiving and Christmas Festivals, and to the Poor Fund. The several amounts appear in the report of donations. Many thanks also to our friends who have so cheerfully responded to our calls for reading matter.

Could the many friends of seamen who know so little of the sailor nature share in some of our experiences, or read the grateful letters that are written by those who have enjoyed the benediction of this Mission, I am sure it would stir their hearts and open many purses in behalf of our brethren of the sea.





### Report of the Missionary

IN CHARGE OF THE

### Church of the Holy Comforter.

By divine guidance I have tried to keep steadfastly in view the purpose of the Board of Managers of this Society, the religious and moral welfare of seamen.

Captains and officers of the steamship lines, have said to me that this has been one of the most trying seasons upon the deep that they have ever experienced. Therefore the greater incentive to make the grand canal to our church services, the reading-rooms, more homelike and attractive, and we have succeeded as never before, with both officers and men ! They have shown their appreciation by coming directly from their ships to us.

That was a happy and long to be remembered night in mid-winter when we gave to seamen who entered port the day before with frozen faces, a musical entertainment lasting three hours, with a benediction of hot coffee and bath buns. From that evening seamen from the French Line have been coming to us. Therefore, as in the past, I cannot emphasize too strongly the grand work of our reading-rooms. They are the vestibule to our Church.

A good feeling has been established this past year, by the kind thought of our beloved Bishop, between the Seamen's Institution, of Liverpool, and our own work. Christ is binding the seamen together around the world.

In December I secured a chapter of Saint Andrew's Brotherhood. We have fifteen men banded together for Christ and seamen. We have also "The Comforter Circle of King's Daughters," composed of sixteen ladies. Through their efforts this past year about six hundred bags for seamen have been given away. These bags are made of some bright material, and filled with testaments, scriptural texts, buttons, linen thread, needles, pins, wax, and the old-fashioned red handkerchiefs and woolen wristlets.

The work is becoming more spiritual each year by the more frequent demands for the use of the Church and her services.

At the special Christmas services for seamen, held in the Church on Monday, December 31st, January 8th, and 16th, there were one thousand persons present, and of seamen six hundred and twenty-five.

A third service held in the Church on Sunday evenings, between Advent and Easter, has given us an average attendance of about eighty—sixty of these being young men. We have had good music, and plenty of it, and the sermons have been talks to young men. The total attendance for the fourteen Sunday evenings was nine hundred and ninety-three.

Fifteen services were held during Holy Week, giving us an attendance of three hundred and thirty, about one-third of that number being seamen who were present at the Stereopticon Lectures on the Life of our Lord, and the Good Friday services.

The spirit of the Sunday-school is good. Their self-denial offerings during Lent, which amounted to eighteen dollars, have been set apart to purchase ice for the reading-room fountain. Mrs. E. A. Gardner, with five assistants who have given their services, has had one hundred and twentyfive names, with an average attendance of fifty young girls who have been taught in the knowledge of the needle. Seventy-five garments have been made and given away. This is the kind of knowledge the people of this neighborhood appreciate.

Sick and destitute seamen have been helped through the Morrill Fund, and the Church Hospital and Dispensary.

Readers of the Churchman, and personal friends, have contributed seventy-five boxes of reading matter, which have been given to the seamen before sailing.

On the afternoon of October 21st, the Bishop of New York made us a visit, confirmed seven adults, and unveiled the beautiful Chancel Window, the gift of one of the Board of Managers, remembered gratefully by seamen.

I wish to tender my personal thanks to the members of the Board of Managers and others for the contributions made for the poor at Thanksgiving, and for the seamen's Christmas and Tuesday evening entertainments. The individual amounts will show in the report of donations.

May Almighty God, through the agency of the Board of Managers and the friends of seamen, rescue thousands for Christ and His Church, and may they through the Holy Spirit's influence, be made the happy servants of Him whom we love to call our Saviour and our Risen Lord.










View from Reading Rooms, Church of the Holy Comforter, 341 West Street. Steamship "ETRURIA."

### Annual Report of the Missionary

IN CHARGE OF

### Coenties Slip Station.

The work of the out-door station of the Society was never more prosperous and encouraging than during the past year, and its present condition and out-look have the promise and potency of a widening and deepening efficiency and influence. All the agencies and modes of operation which the wisdom and experience of the Board of Managers have devised for the temporal and spiritual well-being of the sea-faring community have been successfully prosecuted, and have produced results transcending the highest expectations of the Missionary.

The Sunday services which are held on the Pier during the summer months have been truly inspiring. Reverence and devotion have marked the behavior of the congregations. The hearts of men and women have been responsive to the Gospel, and the characters of some have been moulded for all time by the plain statements of Divine truth. In the conviction that the simple story of the Cross has an ennobling and saving efficacy the Missionary relies on the inherent power of the preached Gospel to reform and elevate his hearers.

The size of the congregations at the in-door services in winter, has been satisfactory. \* \* \* \* If results are the evidence of success, never has the Coenties Slip Station produced more fruit than during the past year. The number of communicants has increased, and for the first time in the history of the Station a class of thirteen persons who voluntarily desired the full privileges of the Church, were presented for the Apostolic Rite of Confirmation.

In the conviction that Christianity is for the happiness of men in time as well as in eternity, for their bodies as well as their souls, your Missionary, in the execution of suggestions of the superintending committee, organized Social Clubs, with a view to the satisfaction of men's social propensities. These Clubs have been more than a success; they have deeply interested the boatmen and sailors, and aroused their warmest enthusiasm.

The number of sailors who have taken advantage of the reading-room and the literature provided them the past year, has been phenomenal. Within a circuit of one hundred yards of the reading-room there are about twenty saloons, and the Mission Station is the only beacon light for the guidance heavenward of the sailors and boatmen, and the only refuge and protection from the temptations and evils of the neighborhood. The Missionary cannot fully express his gratitude to the members of the Board, who so liberally contributed to the Christmas Festivities, which were a source of genuine enjoyment to the boatmen and sailors.

Language cannot express the irreparable loss to the prosperity of the Station in the death of Mr. Thomas P. Cummings, who, during the entire period of my service in the Society was most intimately associated with the work, and whose never failing presence at the services of Coenties Slip was an encouragement and comfort to the writer, and whose sympathy in my special trials was a solace and support, and whose counsel, direction and efficient aid in my official duties can never be forgotten. His reverent devotion at the services of the Church, his meekness and unfeigned modesty, the outcome of his close and constant fellowship with Christ, impressed all coming within his influence. The radiance of his example and life, and the aroma of his goodness will be a lesson and inspiration to the Missionary as long as he lives.

#### New York, April 16, 1895.

TO THE BOARD OF MANAGERS :

In the last report of the Sailors' Home, only three months of the year were dealt with. I am now enabled to present to the Board the statistics for the full year expiring March 31st last. I regret that I cannot make as enthusiastic a report in regard to the work of the Home, as we all might wish. Under the terms of the subscriptions to the original Home, this Society is bound to continue this work, although to-day there is less necessity for such an adjunct to our Missionary work than there was some forty years ago when the Home was first established. Nevertheless the figures that I present are not without interest, and they should encourage us to feel that our investment and the work we are doing in the Home is not without some fruit.
