Annual Report of the Board of Managers

JANUARY, 1917

The most noteworthy features of the past year have been the steady increase in the use of the opportunities offered to seamen by the Institute, the Consecration of the Chapel of Our Saviour, and the extension of hospitality to those who suffered at sea through the mischances of war.

In practically every department of the work carried on for their benefit, our seaman friends have shown a gratifying response to our efforts by taking increased advantage of the services rendered. There is no doubt that life at the Institute is enjoyed, especially by those who remember the discouraging aspect of the ill-kept and often dangerous lodging houses of their early days. The beneficial reaction upon the men themselves is apparent in their behaviour and appearance; the consequence, however, is that the facilities of the Institute have been strained to the utmost.

Religious and Social Department

The Religious and Social Department of the Institute cannot, of course, be strictly separated from the other branches of the work, for one of its chief aims, in which we believe it has met with marked success, is to create an inspiring, vigorous and cheerful spirit, not only in the Institute itself, but wherever representatives of the Society go throughout the Port. A domestic atmosphere has been developed throughout the

building by our woman missionary, or "House Mother," who takes a very active and effective part in connection with relief work, letter writing, Bible classes, and especially such entertainments as the Christmas Eve celebration and the Christmas dinner.

The usual services have been conducted in the Chapel of Our Saviour in the Institute building, and also in the Church of the Holy Comforter at the North River Station. Special attention has been given by a Scandinavian missionary to the needs of the very numerous Scandinavian seamen.

The entertainments, lectures and concerts in the Institute building have continued as usual and have proved very popular.

It is necessary to chronicle, with regret, the resignation of the Rev. Charles P. Deems, former Assistant Superintendent, who has especially been in charge, under the Superintendent, of the religious and social work of the Institute for a number of years, who has only left to accept a position at the head of a similar work on the Pacific coast, located in San Francisco.

The cost of the Institute building having been paid in full and the remaining debt discharged, the Chapel of Our Saviour was duly consecrated by the Bishop of the Diocese with a most impressive service on the 9th of December.

An emergency call was made upon the Institute on February 3d, when we received a request to take care of the crews of the captured English vessels brought into Norfolk by their German captors on the S. S. Appam. Additional cots were obtained from the Navy Young Men's Christian Association, Brooklyn, and two hundred and seventy-six of the captives were our guests for nearly a week.

Hotel and Restaurant Departments

The total number of seamen lodged during the year has been 189,431, an increase of 20,372 over 1915, and a nightly average of 519. The 41,565 pieces of mail handled at the desk has shown an increase of 7,019 pieces over the previous year. At the Lunch Counter 275,902 meals were served, and in the Officers and Staff Dining room, 38,616; a large increase in both classes. The daily average number of meals was 861. The maximum number of meals served at the Lunch Counter on any one day was 1,325. In spite of improvements in the equipment of the kitchen and store rooms, careful buying and economical saving of waste materials have made it possible to conduct the restaurant without loss.

Seamen's Wages Department

In this department has occurred one of the greatest increases for the year. We have received in deposits, \$164,596.29 more than in 1915, the total deposit of seamen's wages amounting to \$403,894.06. Practically 25 per cent. of this amount, namely, \$103,841.43 has been transmitted upon the order of the depositors to 370 different cities and towns in 93 countries of the world. The increase in the number of depositors was 1,044, making a total of 4,624. Most of the money is sent to the parents or wife, and signs throughout the building reminding the men that they may transmit money undoubtedly cause them to think of their families and accept the opportunity. Because of these signs, many have learned the lesson of thrift and become regular depositors.

Shipping Department

The Shipping Department also shows an increase of activity though not so great as might have been expected from the rise in seamen's wages. We have found employment on ships for 5,125 men, 108 more than in 1915, although furnishing them to a fewer number of vessels. The customary operations of this department have, of course, been much hampered because of the war. Most of the vessels which formerly sailed for South America sailed in 1916 for Europe, and the crews being British, signed and paid at Liverpool, there was not the same demand as formerly for entire crews. On the other hand, there has been a shortage of men willing to go to sea, notwithstanding an increase of ten dollars or more per month, together with the twenty-five per cent. war bonus.

Navigation and Marine Engineering School

As a department of the Institute, this is a new feature which is succeeding very well. The School formerly known as the New York School of Navigation, under the joint management of this Society and the West Side Branch of the Y. M. C. A., was transferred entirely to the supervision of this Society, and has been reorganized as an exceptionally practical school. Captain Robert Huntington, for twelve years principal of the Huntington Navigation School of Boston, has been retained as instructor under a contract, and during four months has enrolled twenty-seven pupils, of whom eleven have already been examined and passed by the Official authorities for the positions of master, chief, second and third mates. In spite of inadequate equipment, the School has made a good start. New quarters will be provided in the additional rooms under construction on the roof of the Institute building.

North River Station

Excellent and important work is being continued in West Street and on the North River front at this station, at the foot of West Houston Street. The general relief work, visits to vessels and hospitals, distribution of clothing and reading matter, as well as the church, social and boys' club activities, have been carried on with renewed vigor and unusual persistence and sympathy. The future development of both land and water front in this neighborhood is very uncertain, but in the meantime the Institute is rendering a highly valuable service.

Financial

We wish to take this opportunity of thanking our many friends for their loyal support and interest. It is most gratifying to note that the contributions have increased over last year as the magnitude of our work for seamen becomes more widely known. It is an interesting fact that 42 per cent. of our contributions come from outside of the City of New York, and that we have received contributions from 47 states, as well as from the District of Columbia, Canada, England, China, the Canal Zone, Honduras, Brazil, Guatemala and the Philippine Islands.

Both the operating expenditures and the operating income for the year exceeded expectations, it being interesting to note that the increase both in income and in expenditure occurred in the income producing departments, such as the Hotel, Restaurant and Shipping Departments. In the non-income producing departments the actual expenditure was less than estimated, even though in two of these departments, viz., Engineering and Administration, the estimated expenditure was exceeded.

We believe that the financial receipts and expenditures for the year show a normal, healthy life and sound administration.

Obituary

During the past year the Society has suffered the loss of one of its number, the Very Reverend William M. Grosvenor, D.D., who had been one of the Clerical Vice-presidents since 1896.

Sixteenth Annual Report of the Seamen's Benefit Society

This Society, composed of women, was organized in 1900 for the purpose of assisting the men and boys of the Sea in every possible way, through the Seamen's Church Institute. Its Officers then and now are Miss Catharine S. Leverich, President, Miss Augusta M. de Peyster, Secretary, and Mrs. George A. Lung, Treasurer. The Society during its existence has raised approximately \$22,000, of which about \$8,000 has been expended through the Superintendent of the Institute for entertainments of various kinds, and especially for maintaining the social work among the British apprentice lads. A little over \$11,000 of the above sum was contributed towards the purchase price, rebuilding, repairs, salaries, etc., of the Institute's first boat, the "Sentinel," which was sold the latter part of 1914 and was succeeded by the present boat, the "J. Hooker Hamersley." The balance about \$3,000 of the total amount contributed was subscribed to the Building Fund of the present Institute. The construction and equipment of the Apprentice Boys' room in the new building were paid for by the Seamen's Benefit Society. Among other things the Society presented to the Institute in 1903, its first House Flag; in 1904 it installed a successful Coffee Bar in the Battery Station building at No. 1 State Street and established lecture courses on First Aid to the Injured. The Society gave two of the Seamen's bedrooms in memory of the Officers and Crew of the "Titanic," and the fund for the Light House Tower, which was erected to the memory of all who lost their lives on the "Titanic," was collected by the Seamen's Benefit Society, assisted by the American Scenic and Historic Preservation Society. We greatly rejoice that our Active and Associate members and their friends have enabled us to accomplish through the Institute so much for the men and boys of the World's Merchant Marine.

During all these years the members and their friends have continued to send to the Institute money for tea and theatre parties, picnics, knitted articles, comfort bags, cast-off clothing, games, reading matter, towels, sheets, pillow cases, flowers, etc., for the Apprentice lads, and the Institute.

During the year 1916 we have provided funds for maintaining the Sunday and Thursday evening teas for the Apprentice lads and for a number of entertainments. Our members and other friends have as usual sent to the Institute generous gifts of those things referred to above. The Lenten Sewing Class made and sent for use at the Institute over two hundred huck and crash towels. One meeting of this Class was held in the Apprentice room, and, after tea was served, the members inspected the building.

We are profoundly grateful to all who have cooperated with us in our work for these men and boys of the Sea who never before have so much needed our sympathy and help.
