On Monday went to visit Mrs. Thompson whose husband was drowned in the dock near the Rice Mills at 7 o'clock last Friday by 2 passing from an outside schooner (to the ship) where he had been to take home some washed clothes - from his wife he slipped struck his head & sank down into deep water between the vessels & was drowned. On Wednesday, visited a young man by name of Webster - to whom I weeks since I gave a religious book in the Chapel with his sister. He belongs to Hartford but is working in a mill at Brooklyn & lived in 68 Bridget St. He died the next day. The book had made such an impression on his mind

41 that his notes were undivided
on account of it to send in particular
for me to visit him. It is thought he
died at peace with God -

Thursday July 26, 1846 Many

He seemed very sincere. I invited him
much. Besides the sermon went to
