Report of the Board of Managers.

THE MANAGERS report to the Society a continuance of the work and an active growth along the lines laid down by their special duties.

The missionaries in their details will show a faithful attention and a good gain in their results.

The time has come, however, when your representatives feel the pressure upon them for extended labors and for greater means, to enable them to cover the field which is to be cultivated by them.

They must either curtail their growth or more money must be placed at their disposal.

Their expenditures are becoming heavier than their receipts, and unless the Churches shall contribute to their aid they will have to stop, from inability to pay their carefully economized expenses.

In former days they were able to appeal effectively to the Churches of the Diocese, to whom, under the Canon, they look for support, with the reasonable certainty that they would be heard; but of late years. with the decline of our mercantile marine, the pride of the people in their ships has decayed and the interest of the Churches at large in our work has grown cold, while the sailors still remain with us and need help and protection as before.

From six Churches last year we received \$4,043. From all of the others we were given \$590.

Our expenses were \$15,800., our income but \$12,300., a deficiency of \$3,500., and but for the unexpected receipt from land damages paid us by the City, we should have been seriously embarrassed.

We appeal to the members of the Church in the Diocese of New York to look into the subject, and if upon investigation, they find that the Society is worthy of upholding, that they will lay the matter before their congregations and ask from each one a moderate contribution, such as shall in the aggregate make your Managers free to hold out to the many seamen who daily sail into our harbor and land upon our shores, that hospitable welcome which will make them at home and save them from robbery and demoralization.

There is need of a Church and better quarters at Coenties Slip,—the rich have moved away and there is no adequate rallying point in that end of our island to save and protect those who live there in boats, or wander near by from their temporary boarding houses.

It is time that the Society should call upon the charitable and generous to come again to its aid as they so freely did in the time past.



Extract from Bishop Potter's address to Diocesan Convention, Oct. 1892.

"And in this connection I beg to commend to your sympathy and support the work of our Church Mission to Seamen. Here is an agency capable of indefinite enlargement along the lines to which I have just referred, having its field of work, as the recent tragic experience of the City of Hamburg has shown, in those very parts of our own metropolis which will be likely to be early invaded by an epidemic coming to us from abroad; with an exceptionally large and devoted body of gentlemen in its board of management, and, with faithful and efficient missionaries, who have already proved their readiness to spend and be spent in the service of Christ and His poor. Under such circumstances, it would seem to be eminently our duty to strengthen its hands, and to enlarge its capabilities of usefulness by every means in our power."



Report of the Missionary

IN CHARGE OF THE

"Floating Church of our Saviour."

The work of the past year at this Station has been an active forward movement with gratifying results. Stated services have been held uninterruptedly in the "Floating Church" and the Lecture Room, with marked increase in attendance beyond that of previous years; the Reading Room has attracted a greater number of sailors than ever before; the "Floating Church Temperance Society" has cheated the saloons of hundreds of victims, turning their feet therefrom to the sobering and saving influences of the Mission; and the Saturday Night Social Club has been so efficiently worked that, during the Winter, the capacity of the Meeting Rooms was found insufficient to accommodate the numbers crowding within the doors.

Our experience with the Hope Club for Seamen shows that "Jack" is a real clubbable fellow if given half a chance, and his great improvement of late years, in bearing and general appearance, is the manifest fruit of the Church's enterprise on this line in his behalf.

Our Sunday School helpers are much encouraged by the growing interest and increased attendance of scholars, as they are pushing on this arm of the work to keep pace with the other departments of it, recognizing that a Mission for seamen may not forget the training of their children for service in the Church.

The Sewing School,—a busy bee-hive of children, conducted by Mrs. Montgomery on Saturday mornings, continues its helpful mission to a wide circle of worthy families.

The Hope Club, "Stamp Station of the Penny Provident Fund," started here within a few months and doing finely, is a step in the line of much more that we have in mind for the teaching of thrift and practical christianity. The Rev. Arthur H. Proffitt resigned his charge, October 1st, 1892, and I was appointed his successor. My short experience as your Missionary leads me to congratulate myself on becoming one of so ready and efficient a band of co-workers, and to expect that, in the year upon which we now enter, our church may receive a new impetus and its work be greatly enlarged.



Report of the Missionary

IN CHARGE OF THE

"Church of the Holy Comforter."

It is with unfeigned gratitude to "the Author and Finisher of every good work," that your Missionary in presenting his first annual report to the Board, is able to furnish fresh proofs of the Divine acceptance, and blessing on the work of this Society.

Its labors of love have been most potent for the good of sea-faring men, and the spiritual welfare of this community.

I cannot emphasize too strongly the important work which is being accomplished through the instrumentality of our Reading Rooms The introduction of the ice cold water fountain, and steam heat in the Reading Rooms; allowing smoking, together with the entertainments, inaugurated early in the year, have contributed to the largely increased attendance, nearly doubling last year, and have been the means to the end of largely increasing attendance at the church services.

I cannot forbear particular mention of the thirty-one entertainments given in the upper reading room; they have been most helpful to the work, and to the increase of our Sunday services, as was witnessed in last Sunday night's service, when nearly one hundred seamen joined in the service. For all these privileges which the Board of Management are furnishing, I hear many touching words of appreciation, as they leave our Rooms for their ships

The Sunday School is in a flourishing condition.

The Sewing School—started some five years ago, by Mrs. Frances A. Ludlum, is still carried on by the same estimable lady, assisted by Mrs. E. A. Gardner, Miss Bloodgood, the Misses Schermerhorn and Miss Fannie E. Brown who teach the children the art of making their own garments. The forty Lenten services have been attended by nine hundred and twenty persons. Sunday, July 17th, I presented to our Bishop, sixteen persons for Confirmation, four of whom were seamen.

Fifty sick and destitute seamen have received aid from the Morrill Fund The Church, Hospital and Dispensary, has proved a great blessing to our seamen.

My sincere thanks to all those who have contributed reading matter.





Annual Report

OF THE

Missionary of Coenties Slip Station.

Your Missionary is called upon once a year to make a report of work done in a location where he may properly claim to work alone.

It is the reproach of the Church and often expressed in the daily and religious press that the Churches are moving away from "down town," leaving the more obscure and less prosperous population to their own devices.

If you will realize the place where your Missionary sits in his daily duty—you will note that not one place of worship is nearer to his little Chapel in Coenties Slip than Trinity and John Street Methodist Episcopal Church, over a range of the town wider than most great parishes. At the lowest end of all stands this Mission tending Sailors and Boatmen and their needs, where boats and ships have anchored since the Island was first inhabited by the Dutch

In the summer the wide Pier and the open air make the services on Sunday more acceptable to the population of this part of the town.

In the winter we feel the need of larger quarters and if we could only get it, of a House, Bethel—where His lowly children could be gathered in and given rest and instruction with warmth and comfort.

Our winter quarters are too small and your Missionary grows old in the faint hope that kind Christian men may see the need, and come forward to provide the means to build a place to the glory of God and the help of man.

The work of the past year has moved on in its routine. Your Missionary has done his best and leaves to his Divine Master to judge in mercy of his faithfulness.
