you know that your labor is not all
in vain & that through your preaching
is generally to those who go down to the sea.

I have attended at ~~your~~ Bethel
for some years every time I have
been in Port and often have wished
to speak to you on many subjects that
you have preached upon, but I with
not muster up courage enough

I now have an acquaintance ^{with}
living in New York, and she ^{has} often ^{for}
often heard me speak of you, your name
is as familiar to her as her own, it
she not long ago wrote me, that choice
had taken her to the very Bethel where
I received most of the instruction I ever
had, and I have therefore ^{written to her} taken the
opportunity of enclosing this for you
and also five dollars which
I beg you to place in the box
for sailors books I received a number

is a bible you gave me a long
time ago. Dear Sir lay out the
small sum I have sent in Bibles
That is a book a sailor can always
go to in storm or in calm when
walking the deck or sitting in his
berth that is an ever ready
comforter, and many a time has
it comforted me in dangers on
the deep, particularly the words
from which you once preached.
Isaiah 43. 2. When thou passest
through the waters I will be with thee
&c. and through the rivers they shall
not overflow thee. When thou walkest
through the fire thou shalt not be
burned; neither shall the flame kindle
upon thee. For I am the Lord thy God
the Holy one of Israel thy Saviour -
Dear Sir if it would not be asking
too much. I should like some time
to receive a line in your own hand
to know that you are well and still

going on rejoicing in your calling
The person who delivers this will at any
time enclose it in his letter -

SINKING OF A CHURCH.—The Floating Church of our Savior, for Seamen, at foot of Pike-st., was injured slightly in one of the boats on which it rests by the late storm, and overburdened by the accumulation of about 15 tuns of snow on one side of the roof, sank yesterday morning at 4 o'clock, in 35 feet of water. It now hangs to the wharf, held up by the chain moorings, and with the water up to the ceiling.

The chapel has inclined at an angle of 25 degrees towards the South. The water is even with the eaves on one side and about half height of the window on the other. The kneeling table and other articles were moved about one yard from the wall. The pews were just the style, 2 feet 6 in. in front of the other. The side of the church is two chains and two chairs at each end. The tables are fast to the wall. Chains are under the seats. The body of the edifice has been brought upon an even keel. The tide raises the water 6 feet in the inlet and at full sea of the Sluice Ch.

At 4 P.M. Saturday, Jan'y 15, 1853 I received a letter from Capt. Payne of the Sailors Home in Cherry Street offering to me the use of the Reading Room of the Sailors Home in which to hold the services from Chapel - tomorrow Sunday Jan'y 16, 1853 which I accepted.

20 men were occupied all day in getting two Chains under the Church and in rigging Guys, Stacks to raise the Church from the water.
