Dr. Hawker's eloquent address on the ground
of charity & the reasons for the preference than
charity to labor - which amounted to

In the morning I officiated to a full congregation and preached on the text: What hast thou to do with peace?

After which, I administered the Communion to 33 persons. This morning before service a lady - Mrs Joseph Ellis who lives 140 Cherry St, called at my house for religious conversation. She had attended the Chapel some time. I had heard her spoken of during the last week by some of the congregation who told me the lady in black seemed deeply affected by the service on Sunday last, and seemed to be in tears during the whole sermon in the afternoon. She wished she said to come to the communion

Nov 4, 1849

this day at the Chapel. She had long felt it her duty and had been pulling the subject off from time to time till she could have no peace any longer while she was not admitted to that holy ordinance. In this examination of her state, I thought she was a proper subject ^{for} of it. She seemed deeply penitent and overwhelmed with fear about her unworthiness and yet unobscurely desirous of participating in that holy rite, especially as she was soon to leave the city for Matamoros, Texas with her husband. I told her if she was ready and willing that day to give herself up to the service of Christ for time and eternity, as she said she was I should advise her coming forward. After exhorting her to seek Divine guidance by prayer. Never to leave man to go by prayer after her religious profession and her agreeing to come to see me for more religious instructions tomorrow afternoon she left me. I found her among the number of those who knelt at the channel & received at my unworthy hands the symbols of the lawless brotherhood of blood.

No 41 D49 This morning on entering the Chapel at 9 AM
I found a fine looking sailor like man
leaning on the rail on the guards. He
seemed anxious to say something but restrained
from some motive and after waiting a moment
to see if I was mistaken I proceeded
to the vestry and arranged the common
Bible for the Lord's supper at the morning service
When I got back to the vestry he came in ac-
companied by the sexton who said to me
here is a man, ⁱⁿ who wishes to sign the temper-
ance pledge. In the conversation with which
I then entered with him the following facts
were developed. He has been a sailor & followed
the sea till he became an officer and then
he married - and has since kept a large
sailor boarding house No. 45 James St. He
has long been a hard drinking man. That
recently attended our chapel very often. He
has often got drunk himself at his own bar
& got many sailors drunk, with his liquor.
He ^{has this day} now, resolved by God's grace to break off

entirely from drinking himself or encouraging
 or permitting others of he can help it, to
 drink. He determines this day to shut
 up his bar, throw away his liquor & sign
 the pledge and lest he should break away
 from his resolution he came down to the
 Chapel 2 hours before the ^{of the ground} service & resolved
 at least to hold on to the nail, there and
 out quit the coats of the Chapel until he had
 seen me and signed the temperance pledge
 at my hands. He made himself by God's grace
 a free man. He said he had been an involuntary
 man too long & now he wished to reform. I directed
 him to pray for God's spirit and grace & then
 after some further religious conversation gave
 him the pledge & sign. He said he wished to show
 his certificate to all his boarders & wished me
 to have it framed for him and he would pay
 for it & hang it up in his house. I promised
 to have the certificate filled up of the New York
 Marine Temperance Society & do as he wished me
 to do with it. In the afternoon he came to
 Church again having been observed very

Much engaged in our services in the morning; and after the service he came to me having worked till near dark until after I had got through giving out religious books and tracts to about 20 men young & sea and conversed with them - and then brought forth him a companion whom he said he persuaded to join him in doing what he did in the morning - that is sign the pledge & he wished to put his name on the same paper he had signed. I then handed it to him
